Angelo Perciballi will take you through the hows and whys of electricity in his first “The Magic of How Things Work” seminar on Monday, October 5, from 6-8 PM, in the Institute classroom at 135 N. Grove St. in Eustis.

Perciballi will also discuss the various kinds of light bulbs; which are best for your purposes and which are the most energy and cost effective.

Angelo Perciballi will hold a total of six Monday evening seminars (Oct. 12 – Nov. 9) in which he will take the magic out of everyday technology and explain how it really works. On October 12, he will tackle cell phones, CD’s, and television.

He is the expert we all need to take the mystery out of the gadgets. He is a retired Air Force General with a Master of Science degree from Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He works as an engineering systems consultant.
